Cooler Weather will be here before You Know It!

There is less brood, less bees. More and more robbing. The summer is winding down and we've had a few cooler nights. How are your bees? Are they still queenright? Do they have enough food stored up to get through the winter? The bees know the weather better than any of us. The drone population isn't what it was just a few weeks ago. You may have put an entrance reducer in to prevent robbing when you put some sugar syrup on the hives. It's a difficult challenge, feed the bees and risk robbing? Or wait and maybe they may starve? Smaller colonies are certainly at risk for being robbed if you have a huge colony close to them and they smell that food.

Have you knocked the varroa population down in the hive? They don't call them Varroa Destructor for nothing, they not only suck the life out of your bees (literally) they also spread disease. The hive is going to lose so many workers and the small amount of brood they will be able to get to adult-hood in the winter will have a hard enough time surviving without a full blown varroa infestation. Get your treatments in, especially now that you've taken off your honey. Moth-proof your supers and store your equipment safely and well closed preventing mice, moths and others from damaging those honey supers.

Combine smaller weak colonies that do not appear to have enough bees or honey to survive winter. Check your stands, settling can cause hives to tilt backwards, holding moisture in them.
