#### **Spring has Sprung!**

The weather is finally staying a bit on the warmer side. We still will have a few cool nights here and there. Hopefully you've had your bees make it through the winter and your queens are starting to ramp up their egg laying. Swarm season is here. We've had reports of several hives swarming already! Do your best to keep the hives in your yards from swarming by giving the bees some room to expand. It's a tough balance now with hive beetles, you don't want to have too much territory for the bees to cover, but you want to give them room to expand and grow. Make sure you have good mated queens in your hives. If you find some supercedure cells, or swarm cells in your hives, you may need to cut them out to try and slow down a hive that wants to swarm. If the bees have their mind set on swarming, it's near impossible to stop them. Creating a nuc, splitting your hives and moving the split hive with the queen may give them enough of a change and 'fee' that they've swarmed. Watch the weather, it is still early and although you may see some drones in your hives, it's no guarantee that a newly emerged queen is going to be well mated, especially with our fickle weather. If she doesn't have warm enough temperatures, or if it's raining or too windy, she won't go out for her mating flights. Poorly mated queens or ones that cannot mate at all will be drone layers. Watch your capped brood to make sure you have a good laying queen.

Soon the Black Locust trees will be bursting with flowers and the honey flow will kick off in our area. Make sure you have healthy bees to replenish their dwindled food supplies and begin to work on gathering surplus honey.

If only that were full of honey...


Photo on the right is a bee on Plum Tree blossoms sent by Bonnie Greer. The bees were all over the tree. I hope she has a great plum harvest this year!
